the mystery of Christ is at work in a hidden manner in the natural world as a whole." (Pope Francis, Laudato Si' #99)





In the encyclical *Laudato Si'* Pope Francis calls us to a very specific area of reform and names it "ecological conversion".

Pope Francis challenges us to turn away from an anthropocentric relationship with Earth to an eco-centric one, a relationship that is Earth-centered and one that values all of creation as an expression of God. This issue of JPIC News offers us an opportunity during this Advent season to reflect on the Sunday scripture themes in light of our "vocation to be protectors of God's handiwork...recognizing that every effort to protect and improve our world will entail profound changes in lifestyle." (LS #5, #217) We pray for the grace to be open to and commit to these changes.

Advent – Week 1: Be watchful! Be alert! Be aware!

Advent - Week 2: Prepare the way of the Lord... Repent

Our goal is to become painfully aware, to turn what is happening to the world into our own personal suffering and thus to discover what each of us can do about it. (LS #19)

A healthy relationship with creation is one dimension of overall personal conversion, which entails the recognition of our errors, sins, faults and failures, and leads to heartfelt repentance and desire to change. (LS #218)

Advent - Week 3: The spirit of GOD is upon me; he has sent me to bring glad tidings to the poor.

Signs of Hope for Earth

- At least 15 countries have joined an alliance against coal use at the United Nations climate change negotiations which took place in Bonn, Germany a few weeks ago. The alliance was initiated by Canada, the UK and the Marshall Islands. Current members also include Denmark, Finland, Italy, France, the Netherlands, Portugal, Belgium, Switzerland, New Zealand, Ethiopia, and Mexico but the goal is to sign up at least 50 countries by the 2018 UN climate summit. Major coal users like China, the US, Russia, and Germany have not joined. China, however, has put forward an ambitious plan for solar energy, as has India.
- A total of 20 U.S. states, 110 U.S. cities, and more than 1,400 businesses have pledged to cut their fossil-fuel emissions to ensure the U.S. meets its commitment under the Paris Climate Agreement—even if the Trump administration acts on its intention to withdraw the U.S. This group of American cities, states, and businesses who remain committed to the Paris Agreement represents a bigger economy than any nation outside the U.S. and China.



Coal plants are a primary source of carbon dioxide (CO2) emissions, the primary cause of global warming. Burning coal is also a leading cause of smog, acid rain, and toxic air pollution.

We Are Still In is a United States network of more than 2,580 mayors, governors, CEOs, faith-based groups and college presidents that are committed to supporting climate action to help meet the U.S. emission reduction targets under the Paris Agreement.
