One year ago this month the Congregation of Bon Secours embarked on a journey of "ecological conversion" in response to Pope Francis' invitation to us in *Laudato Si'*. Over these months we have learned that an ecological conversion calls us to turn away from our well established human-centered worldview (anthropocentric) and to turn toward a worldview that is Earth-centered (eco-centric). This gradual shift will enable us to increasingly see our human species as a part of creation rather than separate from creation. It will assist us in our desires to relate to and behave toward creation in more mutually enhancing ways thus, truly living our mission focus "to defend and care for all creation".

While conversion happens over a lifetime, it's good to step back every now and then to assess where I/we are on this journey of "ecological conversion". An **anthropocentric worldview** is human-centered. The Earth and all her resources are first and foremost for the benefit of humans. Decisions are made with humans in mind and often for human convenience. (Eg. Single use of paper & plastic, bottled water, fossil fuels, etc.)

- How does Earth benefit from the amount of water I consume?

Plastic Production

According to an article by the BBC:

- 8.3 billion metric tons of nonrecycled plastic has been produced to date.
- Generating 6.3 billion metric tons of plastic waste.
- 9% of that waste has been recycled; 12% has been incinerated and 79% has accumulated in landfills and the natural environment.
- 12 billion metric tons will enter landfills or the environment by 2050 if current production and waste management trends continue. Source: Earth Day Network

Rights of Mother Earth

In 2010 Bolivia hosted a gathering for climate justice advocates called the World People's Conference on Climate Change and the Rights of Mother Earth.

Out of this conference came a call to protect nature by recognizing her rights and thus the Universal Declaration of the Rights of Mother Earth was developed.

The Rights of Mother Earth are a call to abandon the dominant anthropocentric worldview and to imagine a new Earth society. These rights are based on the indigenous premise that asks: If we are all part of Mother Earth, why do some beings enjoy protection and privileges, while others are relegated to the status of things? This is a relevant question for all of us to ponder.

The Universal Declaration of the Rights of Mother Earth

Mother Earth and all beings of which she is composed have the following inherent rights:

- the right to life and to exist;
- the right to be respected;
- the right to regenerate its bio-capacity and to continue its vital cycles and processes free from human disruptions;
- the right to maintain its identity and integrity as a distinct, self-regulating and interrelated being;
- the right to not have its genetic structure modified or disrupted in a manner that threatens its integrity or healthy functioning;
- the right to water as a source of life; the right to clean air;
- the right to integral health;
- the right to be free from contamination, pollution and toxic or radioactive waste

How are these rights a way of protecting and defending all creation, the mission focus of Bon Secours?

How do these Rights of Mother Earth stretch and challenge the ways you think about Earth, relate to Earth and behave toward Earth?

The International JPIC Committee held its in-person meeting in Paris from September 7 -9. Outcomes of this meeting included recommendations for each country to live out our commitment to defend creation, strengthening our relationship with Pax Christi International and UNANIMA, and recruiting help from our sisters and others as we advance the work of justice, especially our Chapter calls, in each country.
