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The Pontifical Council for Justice and Peace and the International Union of Superiors General (UISG) has designated **February 8** as an annual Day of Prayer and Awareness Against Human Trafficking. "Together Against Human Trafficking" is the theme for this year's commemoration, highlighting the great need for global collaboration to eradicate this heinous crime against so many women, men and children.

One anti-trafficking partnership the Congregation of Bon Secours participates in is Talitha Kum - a global collaboration of Congregations of Women and Men Religious who are committed to raising awareness of and eradicating human trafficking. This international "network of networks" was founded in 2009 as a way of connecting religious on five continents as we address human trafficking.

#### Talitha Kum

Inspired by the common, global interest of religious congregations in 76 countries to coordinate and strengthen their work against trafficking in persons, Talitha Kum offers resources to educate and advocate for anti-trafficking legislation that supports survivors. "Talitha Kum", an Aramaic expression found in the Gospel of Mark means: "Little girl, stand-up". These words were addressed by Jesus to the daughter of Jairus, who lay apparently dead. After uttering these words, Jesus took her by the hand and she immediately got up and walked.

This worldwide network of 22 sister-led organizations committed against trafficking in persons chose the expression "Talitha Kum" to define its identity. It is an invitation given to all to stand up and to counter with our voices, our actions and our lives everything that promotes and supports trafficking in persons.

**Red Kawsay** is the network of the Conference of Religious of Peru working against human trafficking in Peru.

Peru is a source, destination and transit country for men, women, and children subjected to forced labor and sex trafficking. Indigenous Peruvians are particularly vulnerable to trafficking. Tourists from the United States and Europe purchase sex from child trafficking victims in areas such as Cuzco, Lima, and the Peruvian Amazon.


**RENATE** has networks in 29 countries in Europe (including Ireland and Great Britain) with 139 anti-trafficking networks.

The Global Slavery Index estimates that there were 129,000 people living in modern slavery in France on any given day in 2016, reflecting a prevalence rate of 2.0 victims for every thousand people in the country.

Hundreds of Nigerian women have been trafficked into Paris as sex workers, lured by the promise of a new life only to find themselves in a cycle of abuse and exploitation. Police believe 150 sex slaves work in Paris' largest park, the Bois de Vincennes.

Dublin, Ireland

**Ruhama** is a voluntary organization based in **Dublin** and works on a national level, with women affected by prostitution and other forms of commercial sexual exploitation. Ruhama is Hebrew for 'renewed life'. In 2014, Ruhama celebrated its 25th anniversary of providing services to women affected by prostitution - over 2,500 women from over 60 countries during those 25 years.

# Human Trafficking by the Numbers

- 40.3 million people are trafficked
- There are 5.4 victims of modern slavery for every 1,000 people in the world.
- 24.9 million for labor
- 15.4 million for sex, including forced marriage
- 7.5 million forced labor victims work in construction, mining, manufacturing, or hospitality
- 71% of trafficking victims are women/girls and 29% are men/boys.
- 5.5 million victims are under age 18.
- Sex trafficking is a lucrative industry making an estimated \$99 billion a year.
