Uprooted and on the Move

- 70.8 million people worldwide are forcibly displaced; equivalent to one in every 110 people.
- The number of refugees, asylum seekers and people fleeing inside their own country is more than the population of the United Kingdom.
- 3.5 million people are asylum seekers.
- 25.9 million people are refugees, half of whom are children.
- 41.4 million people are internally displaced.
- Almost 70% of the world's refugees come from just five countries: Syria, Afghanistan, South Sudan, Myanmar and Somalia, according to the UN High Commissioner for Refugees.
- New internally displaced people in 2018 included: 2.9 million in Ethiopia, 1.8 in the DRC and 1.6 in Syria. Source: BBC News

This sculpture, "Angels Unaware," by Timothy Schmatz was commissioned by the Vatican and unveiled by Pope Francis on the World Day of Migrants and Refugees (9/29/19). The work depicts 140 migrants and refugees from various historical periods traveling on a boat, and includes indigenous people, the Virgin Mary and Joseph, Jews fleeing Nazi Germany and those from war-torn countries.

Migration of other Species

As the planet warms, species are shifting where, when, and how they thrive. They are moving up slopes and toward the poles. That is already altering what people can eat; sparking new disease risks; upending key industries; and changing how entire cultures use the land and sea.

- A record of more than 4,000 species from around the world shows that about half are on the move.
- As mosquitoes migrate to higher elevations due to rising temperatures, malaria now appears higher up mountain slopes in Colombia and Ethiopia,
- Diamondback moths, which ravage the cabbages, kale, and cauliflower grown by poor urban farmers, are spreading in South Africa.
- In Latin America, coffee plant funguses and pests are appearing in new areas, threatening coffee production.
- Steadily rising ocean temperatures are forcing fish to abandon their historic territories and move to cooler waters. The result is that fishermen's livelihoods are being disrupted, as fisheries regulators scramble to incorporate climate change into their planning.
- Everywhere throughout the world, things are happening earlier in the spring—in China, Japan, Korea, across Europe. The time that trees and shrubs bloom in spring determines the entire timing of the growing season. It can completely change the whole ecology of the forest.

Causes of Displacement

Conflict and Violence

- In 2018, Syrians were the largest forcibly displaced population. 13 million Syrians driven from their homes due to violence.
- Colombians were the second largest group, with 8 million forcibly displaced while 5.4 million Congolese were also uprooted.
- The Democratic Republic of Congo has the highest number of displaced people on the continent of Africa, with nearly 6 million people forced from their homes by various conflicts.

Climate change and its effects

 Natural disasters caused most new internal displacement cases in 2018, outpacing conflict as the main reason for people fleeing. The number of people uprooted because of natural disasters is expected to rise to 22 million this year.

Imagine

At our recent JPIC Committee meeting Camille Grippon led us in this activity to help us understand the experience of displacement.



Imagine that you need to leave your home right now. What three things would you take with you? Now imagine traveling to safety seeking shelter. While you travel you need to pay your way for transportation, food and other necessities. What item will you give up to pay for these expenses? Finally, imagine that on your journey you meet a child in great need. What item will you give to help this child? With one item left, what actions will you take to survive? This is the reality for 70 million people right now.
