
This past October, Pope Francis issued his third encyclical, "Fratelli Tutti" (On Fraternity and Social Friendship). Central to this encyclical is the familiar parable of The Good Samaritan that highlights the kind of neighbor we are called to be as followers of Jesus. The Samaritan, the outsider, the one considered detestable and dangerous to the Jews, is hailed as the hero of this story, and Pope Francis suggests that he is an icon for our times. He says, "The decision to include or exclude those lying wounded along the roadside can serve as a criterion for judging every project. Each day we have to decide whether to be Good Samaritans or indifferent bystanders."

As we enter this month of December, with spikes in COVID-19, continued restrictions and lockdowns, and fewer opportunities for personal encounters with any neighbors, perhaps we can choose this sacred space of Advent to notice our neighbors near and far who are suffering and to reflect deeply on the kind of global, national and local neighbor we desire to be. And when this pandemic is over, may our time spent in this reflection truly enable us to become "neighbors without borders." Blessings on your Advent journey!

Neighbors without Borders

Jesus told the parable of the Good Samaritan in answer to the question: Who is my neighbor? The word "neighbor", in the society of Jesus' time, usually meant those nearest us. It was felt that help should be given primarily to those of one's own group and race. For some Jews of that time, Samaritans were looked down upon, considered impure. They were not among those to be helped. Jesus, himself a Jew, completely transforms this approach. He asks us not to decide who is close enough to be our neighbor, but rather that we ourselves become neighbors to all. #80

Abandoned on the wayside

The parable eloquently presents the basic decision we need to make in order to rebuild our wounded world. In the face of so much pain and suffering, our only course is to imitate the Good Samaritan. Any other decision would make us either one of the robbers or one of those who walked by without showing compassion for the sufferings of the man on the roadside. The parable shows us how a community can be rebuilt by men and women who **identify with the vulnerability of others**, who reject the creation of a society of exclusion, and act instead as neighbors, **lifting up and rehabilitating the fallen** for the sake of common good. #67

Father of our human family, you created all human beings equal in dignity: pour forth into our hearts a fraternal spirit and inspire in us a dream of renewed encounter, dialogue, justice and peace. Move us to create healthier societies and a more dignified world, a world without hunger, poverty, violence and war. May our hearts be open to all the peoples and nations of the earth. May we recognize the goodness and beauty that you have sown in each of us, and thus forge bonds of unity, common projects, and shared dreams. Amen.

Hold in prayer all those in our world who suffer from exclusion – migrants, LGBTQ people, disabled people, etc. Who else comes to mind? Try to identify with their vulnerability and pray for the grace to reject a society of exclusion.
