I recently attended the Justice Conference of Women Religious' (JCWR) bi-annual Convocation entitled: *Embracing and Acting from an Ever-emerging Consciousness*. What a breath of fresh air this convocation provided! Our speakers, Sr. Sharon Zayac, OP and Sr. Toni Nash, CSJ inspired us, challenged us and stretched our consciousness of who we are as a human species and expanded our perception of how we might engage in the work of justice moving forward.

Sr. Sharon the co-founder of Jubilee Farm, her congregation's center for ecology and spirituality, focused on the fact that "relationship is the fundamental reality of the Universe" and that our task moving forward is "to restore the rhythm of right relationship with the whole Earth community – human and non-human." Sr. Toni, a religious cosmologist, reminded us that almost everything we have depends on the exploitation of people and the planet and the only way to make changes in this relationship is to do it together. Christina Leano, Associate Director of the Laudato Si' Movement, led us in prayerful reflections throughout our time together reminding us of the importance of intention and attention to all we do. Finally, Sr. Carol Zinn, SSJ, Executive Director of LCWR, challenged us to "imagine something new, something that has not been done before" as we engage in our justice work at this time.

I truly wish all of you, our readers, could have been present at this convocation to experience these speakers firsthand. In lieu of that experience, this Newsletter offers some of the significant thought-provoking quotes and questions the speakers shared at this convocation in the hopes that their words will shape your evolving consciousness of who we are as human beings and the significant role we can play in the transformation of our world that God so loves.



In Laudato Si', Pope Francis challenges us to look at our planet and our place on the planet differently. He says, "A misguided anthropocentrism leads to a misguided lifestyle." #122

Our convocation speakers reminded us that we, humans, need to be conscious of our inherited anthropocentric world view, the foundational belief that humans are separate from rather than a part of creation. Moving away from this anthropocentric worldview to an ecocentric one requires what Pope Francis calls an "ecological conversion". This evolution of human consciousness is currently taking place and is needed on a large scale to address the global crises of our time.

Congregation of Bon Secours Laudato Si' Action Platform Prayer Initiative Ecological Spirituality – Responding to the Cry of Earth June 2023

Ecological Spirituality springs from a profound ecological conversion and helps us to "discover God in all things", both in the beauty of creation and in the sighs and groans of people afflicted in any way. This month as we celebrate World Environment Day and World Ocean Day our prayer will focus on ecological spirituality from the lens of our response to the cry of Earth. The 1st Laudato Si' goal is a call to protect our common home for the wellbeing of all, as we equitably address the climate crisis, biodiversity loss, and ecological sustainability.

Call to Prayer: Let us pause to remember that we, Sisters of Bon Secours, have committed ourselves to a 7-year journey of transformation of our relationship with Earth and all who share our common home. This month as we commemorate World Environment Day, let us especially remember our commitment to respond to the cries of Mother Earth and all her beings: the cries of land, water, air; the cries of creatures great and small, the cries of people: poor, displaced and abandoned. Let us lament from the depths of our hearts, the suffering of God's beloved creation.

(Pause for contemplative reflection)







Reading: "LAUDATO SI', mi' Signore" – "Praise be to you, my Lord". In the words of this beautiful canticle, Saint Francis of Assisi reminds us that our common home is like a sister with whom we share our life and a beautiful mother who opens her arms to embrace us. "Praise be to you, my Lord, through our Sister, Mother Earth, who sustains and governs us, and who produces various fruit with colored flowers and herbs".

This sister now cries out to us because of the harm we have inflicted on her by our irresponsible use and abuse of the goods with which God has endowed her. We have come to see ourselves as her lords and masters, entitled to plunder her at will. The violence present in our hearts, wounded by sin, is also reflected in the symptoms of sickness evident in the soil, in the water, in the air and in all forms of life. This is why Earth herself, burdened and laid waste, is among the most abandoned and maltreated of our poor; she "groans in travail" (Rom 8:22). We have forgotten that we ourselves are dust of Earth; our very bodies are made up of her elements, we breathe her air and we receive life and refreshment from her waters. LS #1

Readings: What is Happening to our Common Home

Climate Change: Climate change represents one of the principal challenges facing humanity in our day. Its worst impact will probably be felt by developing countries in coming decades. Many of those who possess more resources and economic or political power seem mostly to be concerned with masking the problems or concealing their symptoms, simply making efforts to reduce some of the negative impacts of climate change. However, many of these symptoms indicate that such effects will continue to worsen if we continue with current models of production and consumption. LS #25, 26

Pollution: Account must also be taken of the pollution produced by residue, including dangerous waste present in different areas. Each year hundreds of millions of tons of waste are generated, much of it non-biodegradable, highly toxic and radioactive, from homes and businesses, from construction and demolition

sites, from clinical, electronic and industrial sources. Earth, our home, is beginning to look more and more like an immense pile of filth. LS #21, 22

Water Scarcity: Even as the quality of available water is constantly diminishing, in some places there is a growing tendency, despite its scarcity, to privatize this resource, turning it into a commodity subject to the laws of the market. Yet access to safe drinkable water is a basic and universal human right, since it is essential to human survival and, as such, is a condition for the exercise of other human rights. Our world has a grave social debt towards the poor who lack access to drinking water, because they are denied the right to a life consistent with their inalienable dignity. Ls #30

Loss of Biodiversity: Each year sees the disappearance of thousands of plant and animal species which we will never know, which our children will never see, because they have been lost forever. The great majority become extinct for reasons related to human activity. Because of us, thousands of species will no longer give glory to God by their very existence, nor convey their message to us. We have no such right. Ls #33
