To: All people of good will On the Climate Crisis From: Pope Francis November, 2023 Vol. 9, Number 3



"Eight years have passed since I published the Encyclical Letter Laudato Si', when I wanted to share with all of you, my brothers and sisters of our suffering planet, my heartfelt concerns about the care of our common home.

Yet, with the passage of time, I have realized that our responses have not been adequate, while the world in which we live is collapsing and may be nearing the breaking point."

On October 4th Pope Francis issued a "sequel" to Laudato Si' entitled Laudate Deum, "Praise God". Unlike his encyclical promulgated over eight years ago, Laudate Deum is a short 73 paragraph document of approximately 8,000 very powerful words. In these paragraphs Pope Francis presents the sobering reality of our suffering planet including the irreversible damage that has already been done to ecosystems. He calls out climate-deniers and chides international politics for failing our children. Last of all, Pope Francis points a finger at the United States for its "irresponsible lifestyle" that contributes more emissions per capita than any other nation.

You may not be inclined to want to read any further...but we must. We must let it sink into our very souls that our common home is suffering. As I read this apostolic exhortation, it seems to me that Pope Francis is absolutely heartbroken at what is happening to our planet and all her beings. Acting the prophet, he can't hold back. Nor can we. I urge you, as hard as it may be, to read Laudate Deum. Reflect on it. Pray with it. Hold this document in one hand as you hold a picture of your children, grandchildren, grandnieces and grandnephews in the other.

Then take to heart the ever-hopeful words of Pope Francis: "Each new generation must take up the struggles and attainments of past generations, while setting its sights even higher. This is the path. Goodness, together with love, justice and solidarity, are not achieved once and for all; they have to be realized each day." LD #34. What is yours to do today? What is ours to do together this decade to heal our common home?



Pope Francis Identifies the Damages and Risks of the Climate Crisis



"Some effects of the climate crisis are already irreversible, at least for several hundred years, such as the increase in the global temperature of the oceans, their acidification and the decrease of oxygen. This is one of the many signs that the other creatures of this world have stopped being our companions along the way and have become instead our victims." LD #15



"The same can be said about the decrease in the continental ice sheets. The melting of the poles will not be able to be reversed for hundreds of years. For this reason, we are now unable to halt the enormous damage we have caused. We barely have time to prevent even more tragic damage." LD #16



"Certain apocalyptic diagnoses may well appear scarcely reasonable or insufficiently grounded. This should not lead us to ignore the real possibility that we are approaching a critical point. There is no turning back. We cannot state with certainty that all this is going to happen, based on present conditions. But it is certain that it continues to be a possibility, if we take into account phenomena already in motion that "sensitize" the climate, like the reduction of ice sheets, changes in ocean currents, deforestation in tropical rainforests and the melting of permafrost in Russia, etc." LD#17

"What is being asked of us is nothing other than a certain responsibility for the legacy we will leave behind, once we pass from this world." LD #18

"If we consider that emissions per individual in the United States are about two times greater than those of individuals living in China, and about seven times greater than the average of the poorest countries, we can state that a broad change in the irresponsible lifestyle connected with the Western model would have a significant long-term impact."

"There is the need to realize that there are no lasting changes without cultural changes, without a maturing of lifestyles and convictions within societies, and there are no cultural changes without personal changes."

What to expect from COP28:

"The United Arab Emirates will host the next Conference of the Parties (COP28). It is a country of the Persian Gulf known as a great exporter of fossil fuels, although it has made significant investments in renewable energy sources. Meanwhile, gas and oil companies are planning new projects there, with the aim of further increasing their production. To say that there is nothing to hope for would be suicidal, for it would mean exposing all humanity, especially the poorest, to the worst impacts of climate change." LD #53

"If there is sincere interest in making COP28 a historic event that honors and ennobles us as human beings, then one can only hope for binding forms of energy transition that meet three conditions: that they be efficient, obligatory and readily monitored. This, in order to achieve the beginning of a new process marked by three requirements: that it be drastic, intense and count on the commitment of all." LD #59

"To the powerful, I can only repeat this question: "What would induce anyone, at this stage, to hold on to power, only to be remembered for their inability to take action when it was urgent and necessary to do so?" LD #60
